Randy's Ramblings

President's Letter from Randy Bodine

I know some of you have a hard time explaining "going to a tractor show" to some of your more cultured and sophisticated friends. Jana has tried to describe it to some people and the best way has been to compare it to a vintage car show, because most people have actually heard of those shows and understand collecting and showing vehicles.

As of this writing, this week is "Decoration" at the Bodine family cemetery, as well as at other cemeteries in the area. Once again, we have the same dilemma of describing this event. In

Alabama, especially North Alabama, when you say you are "going to Decoration" most people know exactly what you mean. For those of you who may be unfamiliar, "Decoration Day" is an annual observance mostly privately Southern owned graveyards. The family members gather to clean up the graveyard, reconnect with family, and honor the memories of

their ancestors by placing flowers on the graves. "Decoration Day" is most often associated with church cemeteries and family cemeteries on old farmsteads, like ours. Traditionally, everyone would come together to clean up the cemetery, have "dinner-on-the-grounds" and see family on Mother's Day. The timing of when this occurred was based on the agricultural calendar. The period from the middle of May to the middle of June, when "Decorations" are held, is the slower period between planting and harvest. This gave more people the opportunity to help with the cemetery maintenance and to visit with family. This tradition has carried over and we still get together at the same time, even though in today's society, many don't have to plan their schedule around planting and harvesting. Also, unfortunately, many of the younger people no longer see the point of keeping this tradition and supporting their heritage, so in the future, fewer and fewer people may be familiar with this distinctly Southern custom. The same may become true of tractor shows,

unless we make an effort to include the younger generation or add components to the events that the younger generation enjoys.

It was a cold, wet, "raw" (as my dad would say) day for our first club meeting at Snead Equipment in Snead, Alabama on April 20th. In spite of the weather, we had a wonderful turn out – we even had perfect attendance from our board members. This just goes to prove that we are a hardy bunch to want to come to a tractor show on such a day. I'm sure some of the wives might use adjectives other




than hardy (like "crazy" or "nuts", etc.) but we are making memories. Thanks to Joe Criswell for being such a great host.

Our first meeting of 2019 was called to order by president Randy Bodine and he began with an invocation.

His first comment was to acknowledge that all nine of our directors were present for today's meeting along with two of our three advisors. He congratulated everyone for making the effort to come out on such a cool, blustery day following overnight rain storms.

The initial agenda item was Clay's report. He had no additions to the minutes as published in the recent newsletter and said that the chapter balance was now \$10,288 following the completion of 2019 dues collection and payment for the Early Spring newsletter. He made a motion to accept the minutes as printed. There was a second, and the motion passed.

With regard to membership, he reported that our active member number currently stands at 321. This total includes two new out-of-state members added since the newsletter

came out as well as the recent death of Lamar Stewart (#279), a long-time member from Louisiana.

Randy then welcomed three new directors, Steve Allen, Conrad Bell, and Hal Hoaglin, whose terms began on January 1. He thanked new advisors, Buck Brown, Charlie Grimmitt, and Dean Higgins for their service as directors following the expiration of their three year terms at the end of 2018.

Randy then called on vice-president Gary Bell to give a report on the national Winter Convention that was held this year in Kalamazoo, Michigan at the end of February. Gary reported that despite the 5° temperatures and that snow made the trip home a little rough, the convention was good and well attended. He said that we received a lot of positive feedback from other national members about RPRU 2018 and that many on the national level feel that we set the bar for future RPRU show books. People coming by our chapter table often suggested that we should play host to another Red Power Round Up in the near future.

Randy said that we were flattered by this praise, but hosting a Winter Convention might be something we would be more likely to do in the next few years.

The next agenda item was a report by Clay on the status of Show Book sales. He said that we have gotten some orders from the various ads that have run in *Harvester Highlights* and *Red Power* magazine, but we still have plenty of copies available and he urged all Chapter #23 members who have not ordered a copy to go ahead and send in their orders. Copies are available for sale along with other RPRU 2018 and chapter merchandise at today's meeting and order forms can be found in the recent newsletter as well as at the chapter website, www.alabamaihc.org.

Randy then reminded everyone that our next meeting would be June 1, 2019 at the show at Underwood Farms in

Summerdale in Baldwin County, which is near Gulf Shores on the Alabama Gulf coast. Next on the agenda, Randy reminded everyone about upcoming national IH events as well as State Shows that we know are set through 2021.

He also announced that bids are now open for hosting the Alabama IH State Show for 2021. Hanceville will be the host in 2020, but any show that has not hosted for three years is eligible to submit a bid for 2021. Contact Randy Bodine or Clay Nordan if you can speak for a show that wants to be the 2021 host.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.



A Visit to the McCormick - IHC Archives



When the 2019 SEC Champion Auburn (Basketball) Tigers locked in a berth in the Final Four tournament (to be played in Minneapolis, MN) that would ultimately decide this year's national champion, Alabama Chapter #23 president Randy Bodine, who lives in Auburn, started

making plans to attend this "once-in-a-lifetime" opportunity for Auburn University sports fans.

Anyone who knows Randy would not be surprised to learn that he was also cooking up a tractor-related component to his trip "up-north".

Since he knew that the McCormick-IHC Archives is within driving distance of Minneapolis, he decided to fly into Madison, Wisconsin, pay a visit to the Archives for a little research, and then drive a rental car on to

the big round-ball tournament about 200 miles up the road.

Randy had been to the Archives a few years back when the Red Power Round Up was held in Madison, the state capitol, and Chapter #23 has made numerous financial contributions in memory of deceased members to the Wisconsin Historical Society where the Archives are housed and maintained.

The McCormick-IHC Archives employs a full-time archivist, Sally Jacobs, who oversees and makes available to the public the 30,000+ original documents and publications in their holdings that chronicle the history of Cyrus Hall McCormick and the International Harvester Company.

Sally and her staff welcomed Randy and gave him complete access to all the original materials he wanted to see in order to complete his exploration.




