The meeting was called to order by president Randy Bodine and he began the meeting with an invocation.

Randy then recognized Llovd Dillion, Chapter #23 member #394 and representative of the South Alabama Antique Tractor and Engine Club who sponsored the tractor show portion of today's big Loxley Strawberry Festival. Lloyd welcomed us to the show and said they were glad that we had come to Loxley to hold our first meeting of the year.

The first agenda item was Clay's report. He had no additions to the minutes as published in the recent newsletter and said that the chapter balance is currently \$17,822.15.

He also reported that the cost of the recent Early Spring newsletter, \$1234.06, was in line with what we had projected for the first issue of the year since it contained 16 pages and a complete roster of active members that reflected the completion of dues collection at the end of January. The cost of this issue is about \$250 more than the three other 12 page issues published during the year.

He also reported that membership currently stands at 287 and that some new members had already joined today.

There was a motion and second to accept the minutes as printed in the newsletter and the motion passed.

Before proceeding, Randy took a minute to recognize and welcome Kent Davis, member #21/484. Kent is one of our charter members and is from Dozier in Covington County. At age 85 he is probably our oldest member.

Next on the agenda was a report from Vice-President, Gary Bell, about the recent Winter Convention in Indiana. Gary said that the IHC members who attended the convention from all over the U.S. were very excited about RPRU 2018.

He said that when the Alabama delegation was recognized that they got a standing ovation from the crowd. He said that the convention was well attended and that there were lots of parts vendors on hand. And he said that he got a sense from everyone he spoke to that we should expect a crowd in Montgomery and that it's anticipated that our Red Power Round Up will offer something different for national members planning to come South.

The next agenda item was a reminder about the upcoming Red Power Round Up bus trip to Des Moines, IA. The bus will leave Monday, June 12 and return on Sunday, June 18.

Randy then welcomed three new directors to their 3 year terms of service for the chapter. They are: Robert




